- WHEREAS, there are 1,374,031 working-age (18-64) New York adults without a high school credential, and of those, 82,111 are unemployed; and
- WHEREAS, 1,712,990 New York adults do not speak English well or at all, and many here in Onondaga County are eligible to naturalize; and
- WHEREAS, by the year 2024, 48% of New York job openings will be middle-skill and 32% will be high-skill, and in less than three years, nearly 80% of all job openings will require a high school credential; and
- WHEREAS, adult education programs contribute to solving these challenges by helping residents move forward in their educational journey to achieve basic skills and provide opportunities to bridge the workforce supply and demand gap; and
- WHEREAS, the City of Syracuse and County of Onondaga join the State of New York in celebrating Adult Education and Family Literacy Week, helping our citizens learn about their adult education options to attain their professional and personal goals.
